THE CONVERSION OF ST. PAUL

The Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul celebrated on January 25th, concludes the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. St. Paul's conversion caused him to become a great advocate for Christian unity.

Paul, first named Saul, spent the early years of his life studying in Jerusalem and persecuting Christians for going against the Temple. He was even a part of the stoning to death of St. Stephen, the Church's first martyr. Sometime around 36 AD, while enroute to Damascus, Saul was struck down from his horse and heard a voice: "Saul, why are you persecuting Me."

Saul asked, "Who are you?" The Lord answered, "I am Jesus whom you are persecuting." Thus, Jesus identified Himself with His followers

He told Saul to go to the city to learn what to do. Blinded for three days, he was taken into Damascus. There the Lord told Ananius, a disciple, to go to Saul and heal him. Something like scales fell from Saul's eyes." He was healed, baptized as Paul and started preaching about Jesus in the synagogues.

His sudden switch confused the Jews, who subsequently grew angry with him and tried to have him killed. Paul nevertheless continued preaching the Good News of Jesus to everyone at any cost. His conversion, dangerous though it may have been for St. Paul, had a hugely positive effect on the life of the Church. He became one of the Church's great evangelizers and author of the great Epistles of the New Testament in the Bible.

The conversion of St. Paul shows that anyone can be forgiven and brought to a life with Christ, even those who previously were on the completely opposite side of Christianity. "My grace is sufficient for you."
