Saints Joachim and Anne - Feast day July 26

You have probably heard the expression: The apple does not fall far from the tree. It means that children are often like their parents. Scripture does not tell us anything about the parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Tradition tells us that their names were Joachim and Anne. The name Anne means "grace," while Joachim means "the Lord will judge." Tradition also says that Joachim and Anne took their daughter to the Temple in Jerusalem when she was very young. They understood that Mary was a special child, so they dedicated her to God.

We do know that Joachim and Anne have been honored in the Church from early Christian times. By looking at Mary, their child, we can figure out several things about them. They must have set the example that Mary followed to become the loving, gentle, faith-filled, courageous woman she was—the perfect woman to bear and raise the Son of God.

Whether or not Joachim and Anne are the real names of Mary's parents, the couple were the holy, heroic ones who faithfully prepared for the coming of the Messiah.

Because Joachim and Anne were the grandparents of Jesus, they are the patrons of grandparents. St. Anne is venerated in Canada, where there is a basilica in her honor in Quebec.

At the request of some English bishops petitioned by parishioners, Pope Urban VI made her feast an annual celebration. Joachim has been honored in the East from earliest days, but in the West only since the 16th Century. Their names were entered into the Roman calendar in 1584.

ONE OF THE most frustrating yet consoling things about God is his patience. We can see many problems in the world: problems between nations, problems in the culture, problems in our families, and, if we're honest, problems in ourselves. How long, O Lord, will you allow this to continue? Jesus' parables of the wheat, mustard seed and yeast remind us that our perspective on these things is limited. We know from our own experience that we rarely understand what God is doing until long after God has done it. But it is hard to trust the slow work of God. It is often easier to want to destroy evil without thinking about collateral damage. But truth is that evil and good are often entangled. This is as true on the grand scale of world history as it is in the lives of each one of us. Perhaps when we grow frustrated with the world and wonder why God doesn't seem to be acting – at least not in the way we would have him act – we can reflect on his patience with us. And, if we do that, perhaps we will be able to cooperate more deeply in the slow work of God that will make all things right – in God's own time.
